The book is a twist on the classic tale of Snow White by the Brothers Grimm. Since then it has been republished several times, including in 1999, 2004, and 2013. In the Liza Baker's Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, a princess takes refuge from her wicked stepmother in the cottage of seven dwarfs.
