What was the intent of the Homeland Security Act? Organize government operations and communications devoted to national security into one organization. 8 Agencies relocated into the Department of Homeland Security. FEMA. U.S. Coast Guard. Transportation Security Administration. 2 Agencies that were under the Department of Justice before they were relocated into the Department of Homeland Security. U.S. Border Patrol. Transportation Security Administration. 3 Agencies that were under the Department of Treasury before they were relocated into the Department of Homeland Security. U.S. Customs Service. U.S. Secret Service. In July of 2005, the Secretary of Homeland Security announced a major reorganization of the Department. While many of the proposed changes may be effectuated administratively, some might require legislative action due to limits on reorganization authority under the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (P.L. 107-296). Section 872 of the Homeland Security Act gives the Secretary of Homeland Security the authority to reorganize functions and organizational units within the Department either: (1) independently, 60 days after the Secretary provides notice of such an action to the appropriate congressional Buildings of the Department of State. The Homeland Security Act (HSA) of 2002, (Pub.L. 107-296, 116 Stat. 2135, enacted November 25, 2002) was introduced in the aftermath of the September 11 attacks and subsequent mailings of anthrax spores.[1] The HSA was cosponsored by 118 members of Congress.[2] It was signed into law by President George W. Bush in November 2002.[3][4]. HSA created the United States Department of Homeland Security and the new cabinet-level position of Secretary of Homeland Security. It is the largest federal government reorganization since the Department of Defense was created via the National Security Act of 1947. The President of the United States manages the operations of the Executive branch of Government through Executive orders. Executive Order 13958. Establishing the President's Advisory 1776 Commission. Thursday, November 5, 2020. Executive Order 13957. The Homeland Security Act of 2002, as amended, retains in the Department of Justice, under the direction of the Attorney General, the functions of the Executive Office for Immigration Review and other functions related to immigration that are indigenous to the functions of the Attorney General.
